2.1	Shed: (IP) Decision on the Toro mower which has broken down several times over the past 2 years costing £595 in repairs. It has now broken again & will cost approx. £100 to repair (includes £20 transport cost). IP proposed that we sell the Toro "as seen". The orchard could be mowed with the 2 smaller mowers with DE doing a proportion and the remainder done by volunteers from the WWG. The toro is less able to cope with uneven ground and MS suggested that if repaired, it could be used on the more even ground between the orchard trees and the other 2 mowers used on uneven sites. DE supported repairing the toro for a final time. SN proposed that the mowing could done in strips leaving alternate strips unmowed and this would be advantageous for pollinators, whilst keeping the sward short for picnickers.	It was agreed to give the Toro "one last chance". McGaffigans will be asked to ascertain if there is a reason for the recurrent breakdowns. To proceed with the repair if the cost is <£150. To discuss with McGaffigans that if it broke down again what would the secondhand value be and would they be willing to sell it on for us. DE agreed to mow in a mosaic fashion in the Orchard. 2.2	Big Meadow: (IP) Removal of posts formerly used to support the electric fence along the Fauna path & around Alder Pond. The electric fence has been moved from both these areas. The bund around Alder Pond is firm with a thick grass layer and unlikely to be destroyed by cattle. The hedge alongside fauna path in Big Meadow is looking very healthy. Therefore, there are 20 to 30 good quality posts that could be relocated. There are also the 2 metal boxes that house the batteries which should be moved to a less exposed environment.	Removal of the posts in Big Meadow alongside Fauna path was agreed. At Alder pond to leave 2 end posts & 2 mid posts (or at IP's discretion) and remove the rest in case the fence would be required again in this area.				
2.3	Orchard: (GF) Annual Orchard Review 2023. SN thanked GF for the report. The fruit tree team working within the WWG has been very active. AG raised 4 points:	It was agreed that both the crab apple tree & the medlar would be replaced.				

	 One crab apple died as a result of strimmer damage. It is proposed that this should be replaced with another John Downie. A medlar has died due to its roots being in standing water over winter. It is proposed that this should be replaced with another medlar in a different site. We are now below the success indicator of 90% remaining alive from 2011 Natural England Agreement. Widespread strimming damage from several years ago may result in deaths of further trees over the next few years. Volunteers using strimmers & mowers have been instructed to leave a circle of vegetation uncut radius>0.5 m around the trunk of each tree. 			
	IP flagged up that AG had informed him of 2 fruit trees (on the left-hand side coming in from the Sunnyside entrance) being overshadowed by a Wild Service Tree. IP suggested lifting the crown in winter. A large branch from the Ash tree in the stump circle had snapped off recently. Andy Lee had subsequently met with HS & inspected the tree. Andy said the tree was healthy although the fallen branch looked as if it had sustained damage in the previous year. There had been a strong wind the previous night that may have weakened the branch. Andy will return with a younger colleague who will climb the tree & take some of the weight out on the northern aspect. He will also assess if some weight should be taken out of the Ash on the fauna path. The tree on Ashtree corner does not require any work on it. IP commented that there were some further dead branches on top of the ancient sycamore in the Orchard.			
2.4	West Field: grass growth: (R SN). A derogation for hay cutting had been applied for in case it was required. The hay required by dairy farms must be a "clean crop" & therefore there is no market for the grass in West field. CW & SN had discussed bringing in Morecambe	It was agreed that the cattle would be let into West Field although the herd may be too small to graze the grass sufficiently to meet the NE agreement. 	Bay Conservation grazing company in addition to our herd however it transpires that they no longer operate in the Lancaster area. IP had received written viewpoints from Hils & GB that cutting of the grass to a low level would be detrimental to the environment and wildlife. Hils had described the benefits to wildlife of not cutting. SN said that on ecological grounds she accepted Hils argument and that may be where we end up in the future but currently we are within the NE agreement and must do our best to abide by it. SN commented that if an item is put on the agenda with an accompanying paper by one member it is not acceptable for another member to subsequently request to submit another paper that disagrees with the original paper. If there are concerns relating to an original paper then this can be discussed at the meeting or alternatively, if they were unable to be attend the meeting then to contact the author to discuss. 2.5	Flora Field: Margins & beetle banks. (SN) IP confirmed that there was a good margin of bird friendly plants and the nettles had not invaded. IP & RK will monitor. Segments of nettle in the grass margin along the pony wood path had been scythed the previous week.			
2.6.1	Pony Wood: Proposed Woodland Management Plan- IP discussed the corner near the notice board & the double gates. If the fence line was to be altered to bring the fence alongside the path it would create a link between Little Wood & the western extension of Pony Wood. IP proposed more wood pasture around the Pony Wood edges to expand the wood outwards. SN & MS commented that Calum Booth has seen the woodland management plan and was aware of this aspiration.			

2.6.2	Failure of wildflower seeding project pony wood & playground: There have been 2 attempts to sow & plant yellow rattle. There was no sign of yellow rattle in the pony wood semi-circle & it was very sparse in the playground and has disappeared since the drought. IP suggested that SB & CG should take this on as they have experience & success in this area. Yellow rattle seed has been collected by volunteers. SB said a spring sowing (April) of seed was more successful at Greaves Park. HS commented that there was very little below the turf in the playground meadow area except rubble. DB said that there has been success in Heysham, at the end of Sunny Slopes, where the turf was removed, gritstone put down and the seed sown into this. HS said it had not been agreed to use the electric fence in this area and was concerned about the health & safety aspects of volunteers moving the heavy batteries in wheelbarrows. IP said that if the electric fence is not used, it will be a very hard work for volunteers to put a wire fence in to protect the saplings and it would be expensive.
