5. Item for Special Discussion

James McDowell talked about his idea for student placements and took questions. James said that the University would fund the placements and that students would benefit from experience which would enhance their CV's. The Fairfield Association would benefit from the diverse skills of 3-4 students working together on projects connected to our work. Initially the project would be about the Fairfield Association itself, it's history, growth and management. The issue of editorial control was raised and we were reassured that copyright would remain with the FA and might sign Memorandum of Understanding.

James would oversee the project. It was agreed that the FA would benefit from students and we should certainly accept the offer.

- The next Swimathon will be on Saturday 21 March.

9. FOTT

The FOTT summer fair raised £937 and FOTT's share of the Art Exhibition proceeds was £148.

10. FFOG

• To update our four remaining first aiders and train new first aiders at the same timer we are arranging a local First Aid training event, to train a total of 12 people on Wednesday 27 November in the Friends Meeting House. Moreover, the total cost (£370 for the trainer and £76 for the FMH room for a day) will be less than we have been paying to get four people trained in Cumbria.

- It was agreed that the FA scythes could be used free of charge for the scything course Ian is running for local volunteer groups.
- Reports of recent surveys will soon be available on the website. In addition to local birds, flora, butterflies and bees we will now be surveying bats as well.
- We are having a FFOG 'Away Evening' on 17 October at the Toll House Inn, starting at 7.30 pm to discuss how best to manage the nature reserve in general terms in the future. The context for this is the possible ending of Natural England support when our current agreement comes to an end in March 2021 and recent reports of 'rewilding' and other developments elsewhere.
